THOMAS DAVENPORT DIES IN BURKE COUNTY

♦ 8 March 1810 - OBITUARY: *The Star* [a newspaper], Raleigh, North Carolina:

"Died on the 10th of November, 1809, at the house of Martin Davenport in Burke County, Mr. Thomas Davenport, in his 98th year of his age. He enjoyed his health until a short time before his death. Mr. Davenport was remarkable for a cheerful disposition and for benevolence of heart; it is said that he was never involved in a lawsuit but once, and then by being security for a debt, he was sued and compelled to pay the money. In the latter part of his life, he appeared to enjoy the comforts of religion in a high degree.

He has raised six daughters and one son. His eldest daughter **Sophia**, the wife of William White, Esq., of Mulberry, in the County of Burke, hath at this time upwards of one hundred of her posterity living; and it has been ascertained from **Thomas Davenport**, counting him as the first, there are more than forty of his posterity now living in the fifth generation. **Thomas Davenport**'s five youngest children each raised large families, and it is computed that the posterity of those five now living amount to more than 300."

This was Thomas, likely the eldest son of Martin Davenport, Sr., of Hanover. Thomas was surely born on the Davenport home place in King William County c1711. As a youth, he moved up the Pamunkey into the North Anna watershed with his father before 1725, married Dorothy [Strother?] c1732. If he had a part of his father's 400-acre patent of 1727, it was completely within Hanover, for there are no Thomas Davenport land records in Louisa, and no references to him as an adjoining landowner in the few Hanover land records that survive. Thomas moved with Baker and Gambill in-laws to Culpeper County in the late 1740s-early 1750s, then was the Davenport patriarch in the relocation of the families to Burke County in the mountainous North Carolina frontier in the last half of the 1770s.

At the end of the obituary in *The Star:*

"Died at the house of **Martin Davenport**, on the 10th of January last, his wife's mother, Mrs. Sarah Browning, in the 97th year of her age, leaving a large family of children, grand children and great grandchildren.

"The funeral was preached the 17^{th} of February, by the Rev. Mr. Askaw, to a numerous audience."

Martin Davenport, son of Thomas Davenport, married Jane Browning c 1779 in Wilkes County, North Carolina. Sarah Browning was his mother-in-law.
